World-Wide-Walks / between earth & water / ICE (15 mins. © 2014)

World-Wide-Walks have been performed on six continents over the past four decades. These walks along the edge of glaciers at the top and bottom of the globe in Alaska, Iceland, Argentina were performed to witness signs of global warming. Juxtaposed with my walks and a sound score of evolving glacial dynamics composed by Reese Williams are cautionary texts that serve as a counterpoint to the sheer beauty of these places reminders of the fragility of massive glaciers during our current era of accelerating climatic changes. *"Argentine researchers warned that Le Martial Glacier will disappear in 2040 'nothing' will remain of it."* - National Scientific and Technical Research Council

Photons fall upon us. In 8 minutes they have traveled nearly 150 million kilometers from the fusion reactor at the center of our solar system.
